

Awareness of EU citizenship rights

EU citizens are increasingly aware of their rights:



81%

answered correctly when asked about EU citizens' rights



The right to make a complaint to the European institutions



The right to reside in any Member State of the European Union 85%



When in another Member State, the right to be treated in the same way as a national of that Member State

European Parliament elections

EU citizens **can** vote or stand as candidates



71% know this



Elections to the national Parliament

EU citizens living in another EU Member State **cannot** vote or stand as candidate in that Member State



53% know this
